
McKinley and Hoover Schools:

A Centennial Celebration and a Rebirth Highlight the Mastery of Architect William H. Weeks by Jennifer Pfaff

A century ago, McKinley — Burlingame's first permanent elementary school — located at Oak Grove and Grange (now Paloma), opened to great fanfare. Originally named Burlingame Grammar School, the classic brick building with stately columns was designed by renowned **architect William H. Weeks** (1864–1936). While the structure was being constructed, school children attended classes on Howard and Primrose, in a temporary 8-room structure known as "the little red schoolhouse".

Roughly 20 years later, the same architect, William H. Weeks completed Herbert Hoover School, Burlingame's sixth elementary school. Between the McKinley and Hoover school projects, Weeks designed several other California schools, including Burlingame High in 1923, as well as banks, courthouses, lodges, and Carnegie Libraries throughout the state. Hoover School would be the last of the classically designed structures in the Burlingame School District. Unlike the flat parcels on which Weeks typically worked, Hoover's site presented challenging topography; the Spanish Revival style two-story structure was built into the heavily forested, largely undeveloped hillside.

Both Weeks' schools were later affected by the prevailing trends of their times. During the 1950s, much of McKinley's rich brick exterior was stripped of its detail and covered with stucco, then called "earthquake proofing." Hoover was closed in 1979 due to declining enrollment. *Continued on page* 3...

DID YOU KNOW?

The Burlingame Historical Society undertook a research project in 2013 to identify the town's war memorials and then identify the names of those who died in military activities during war. We identified more than forty men and women from Burlingame who lost their lives in the Second World War, the Korean Conflict and the Vietnam War.

There were originally three memorials in Burlingame. Today, only two remain: a plaque at the Recreation Center and a bench memorial at Burlingame High School field. A third memorial at the Post Office on Park Road has disappeared. The Post Office memorial contained the names of 2,000 townspeople who served during World War II.

The Shinnyo-en Buddhist organization purchased Hoover and conducted its various activities at the school until closing its operations at the site in 2007.

McKinley celebrates its Centennial on **September 23, 2013 from 2-4pm at McKinley School** (check McKinley School's website for details) with the recent restoration of many of its original assets. Hoover was reacquired by the Burlingame School District in 2010 and is currently undergoing renovation. In April school district officials broke ground for an attractive new addition that will include five classrooms, a main office, conference and staff rooms and a daycare room. With the recent renovations, these two iconic schools seem destined to last another century. We can only imagine Weeks would be pleased.
